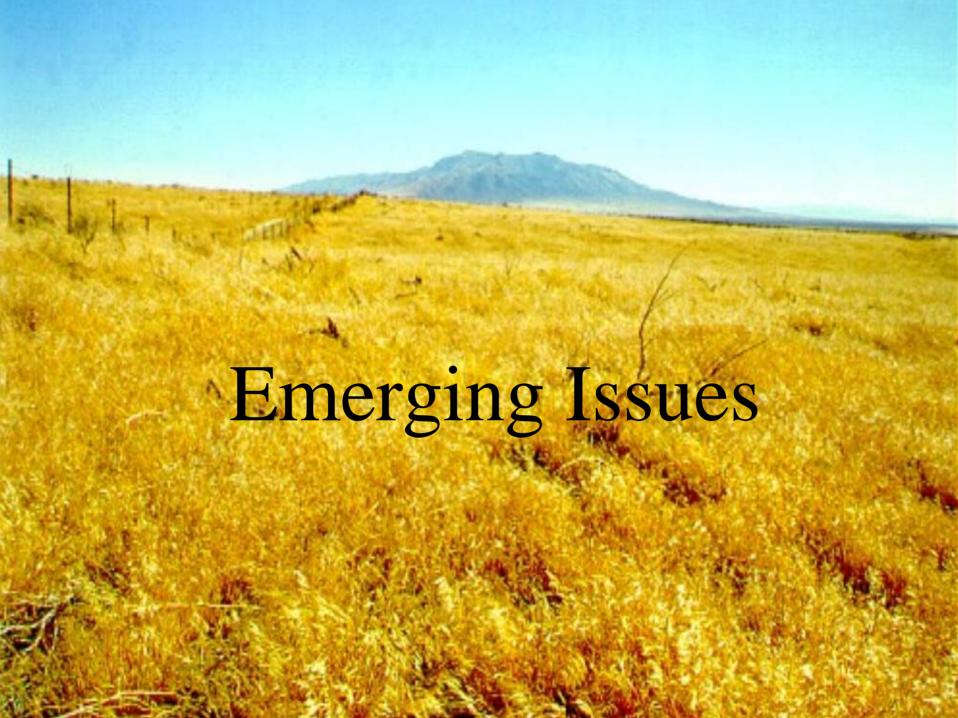




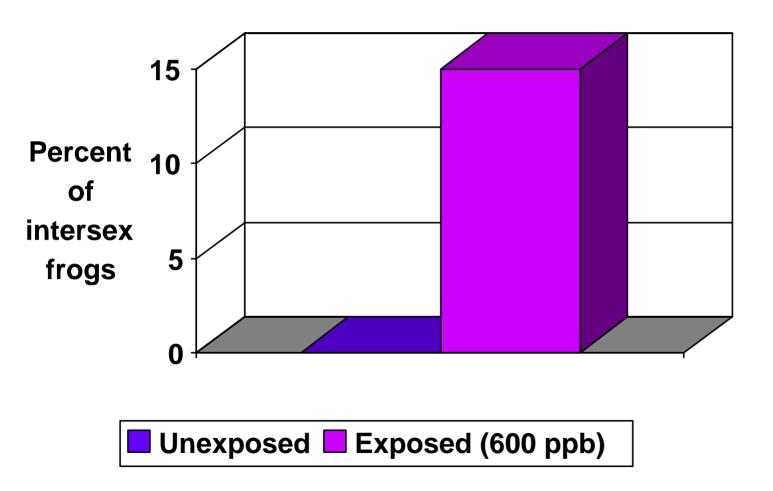

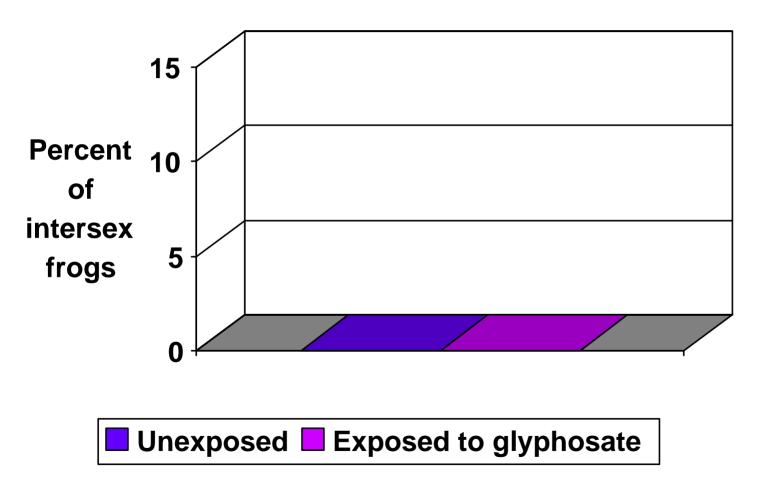


### A glyphosate-containing herbicide caused intersex in *Rana pipiens* (the northern leopard frog).

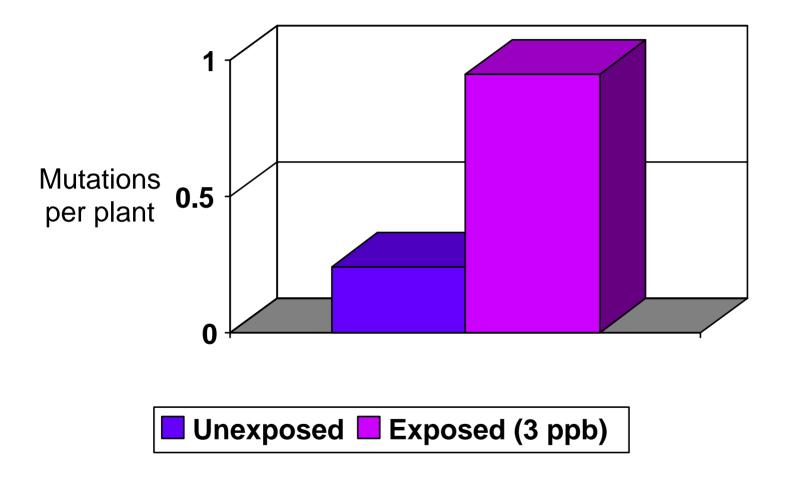
#### Glyphosate, alone, did not cause intersex.

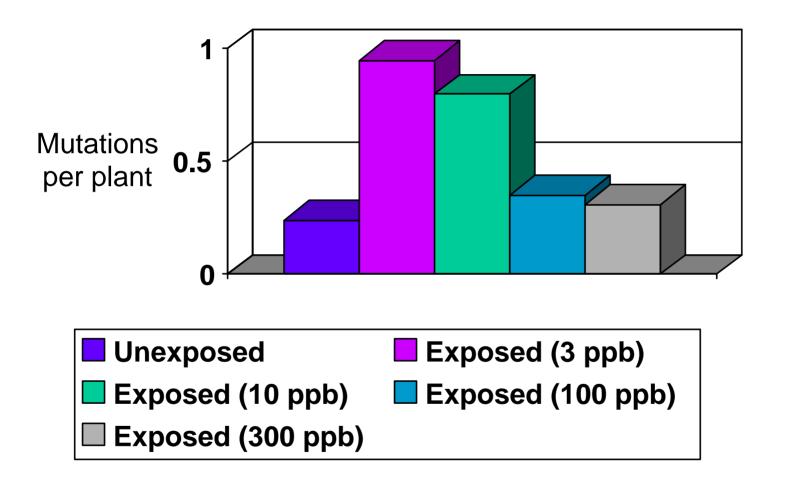


#### Low concentrations of 2,4-D increased mutations in *Arabidopsis*.

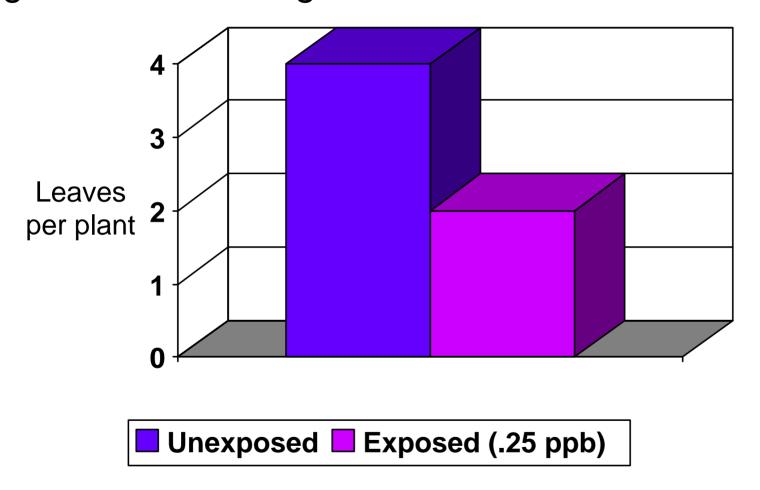
The concentrations of 2,4-D that increased the number of mutations was so low that it did not cause "visible physiological effects" on the Arabidopsis. These low concentrations are also "within the range of those permissible" under national and international drinking water guidelines.

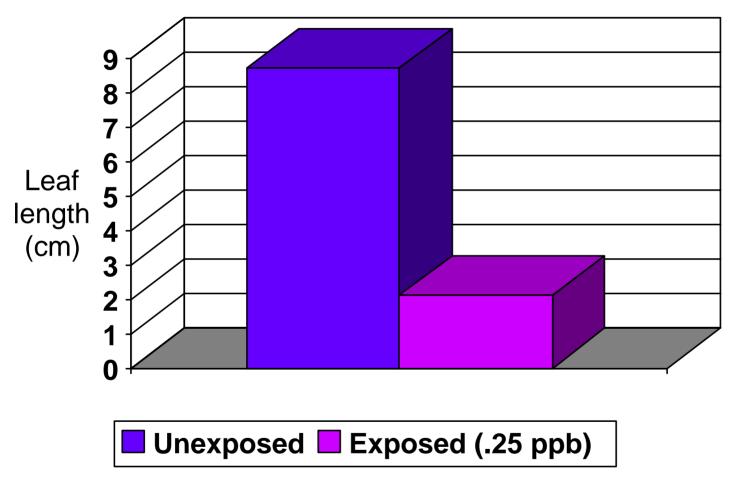


### Minute concentrations of chlorsulfuron reduced growth of *Potamogeton*.



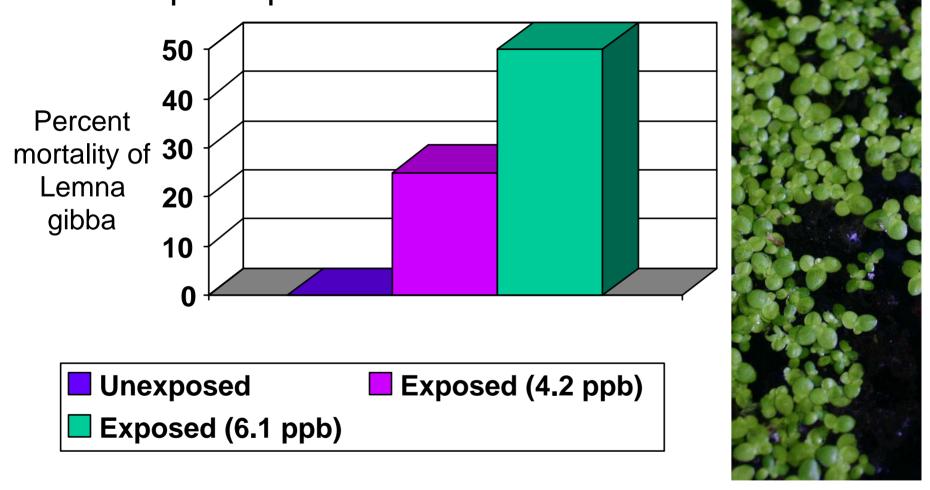

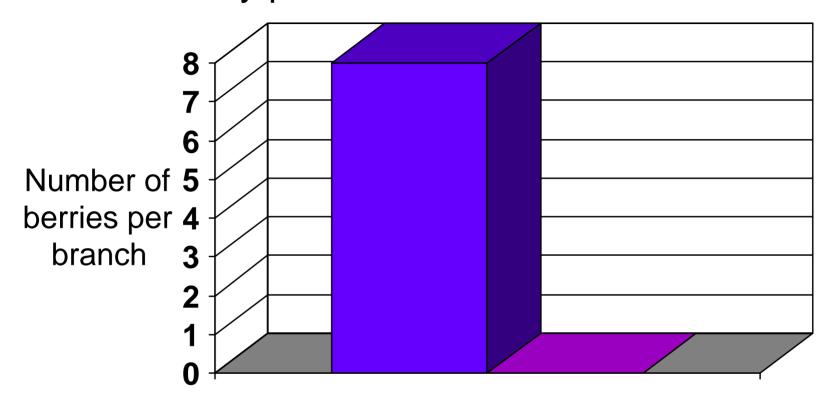
Low concentrations of imazapic caused mortality of an aquatic plant.

Small amounts of metsulfuron-methyl eliminated hawthorn berry production.

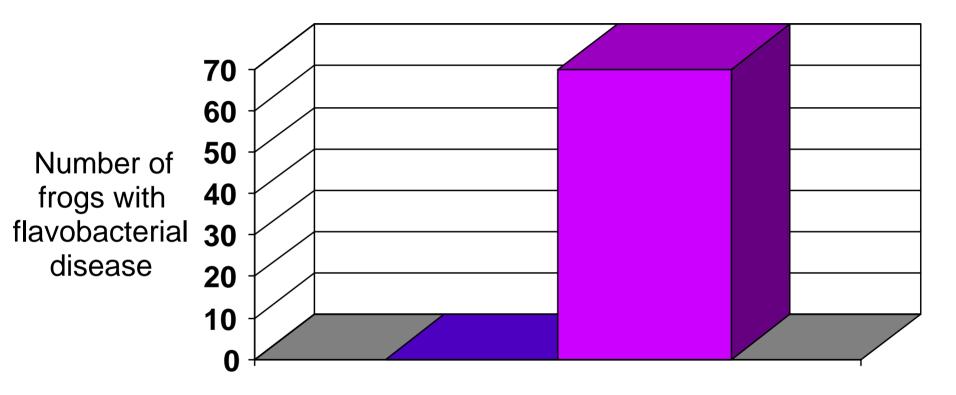


■ Unexposed ■ Exposed (.05 x typical rate)

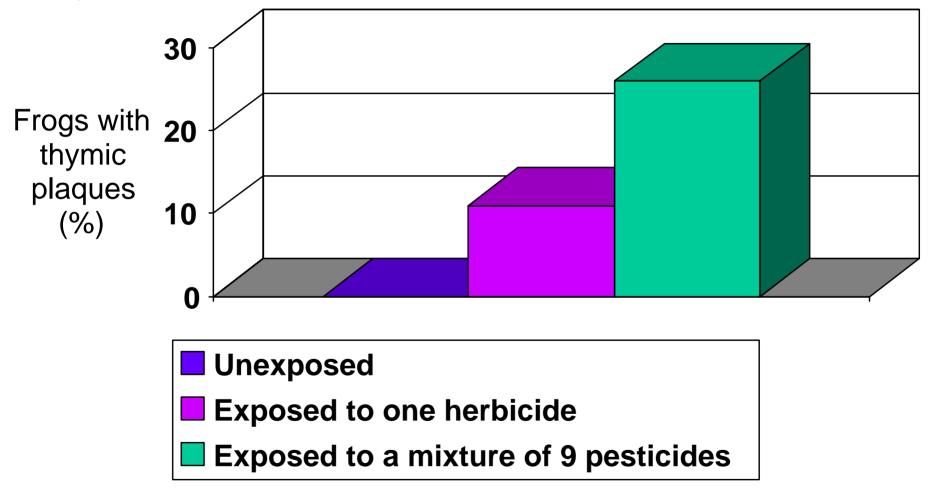
Mixtures of pesticides cause unexpected disease in frogs.

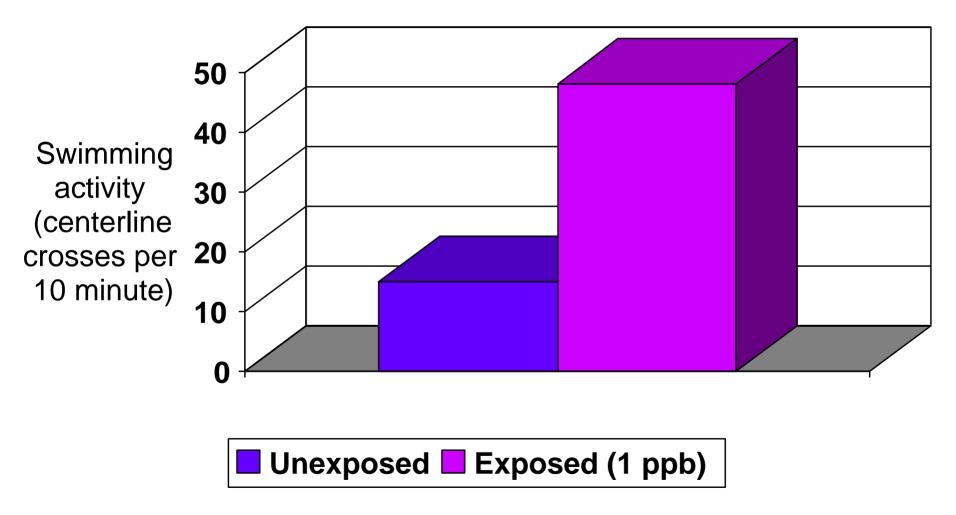
### A pesticide mixture damaged frog immune systems at low concentrations.

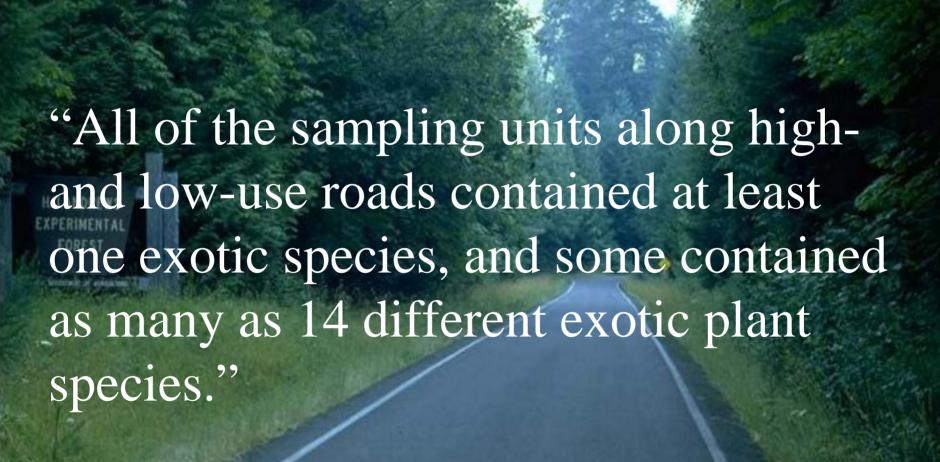

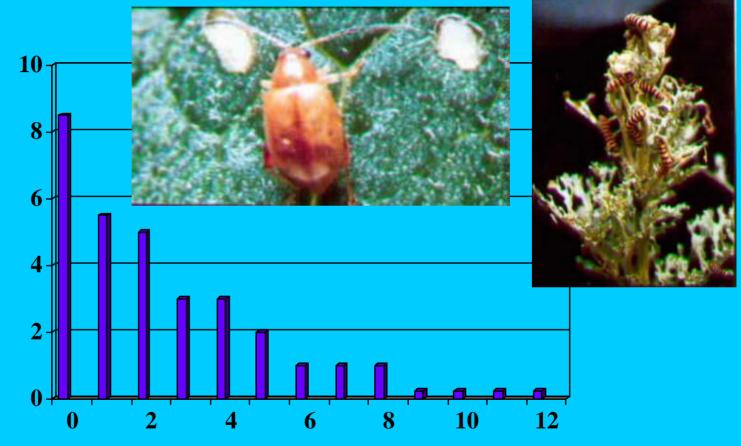
